Reading:

Day 1 - Read Psalm 31, Luke 1-5

Day 2 - Read Psalm 33, Luke 6-10

Day 3 - Read Psalm 58, Luke 11-15

Day 4 - Read Psalm 64, Luke 16-20

Day 5 - Read Psalms 109, 111 and Luke 21-24

Reflection:

1. How are the promises to Abraham, Judah and David all tied together? What kind of future hope is described in the promises to each of these men? See GENESIS 12:1-3, 49:8-12, 1 CHRONICLES 17:10-14.
2. How does Isaiah combine the themes of the future victorious messiah and the fatally wounded victor from Genesis 3:15? Read Isaiah 52:13-53:12: Where is the servant's victory described? Why does the servant die? What results from the servant dying?
3. Recall how Jesus saw himself as freeing people from slavery to the snake's influence (see Luke 13:16 and Acts 10:38). How does the rest of the New Testament describe that same freedom in the lives of Jesus' followers? Describe your freedom in Jesus. What does it mean personally to you? See HEBREWS 2:14-15 and 2 TIMOTHY 1:9-10 for help.

6. Like we said in class, it was impossible for people living before the first coming of Jesus to distinguish the difference in the prophecies about His first coming vs. His second coming. They were expecting physical/political/military deliverance by the Messiah and that is why so many didn't get Jesus' mission. But later, Jesus the Messiah will deliver His people from their physical enemies when He sets up His Kingdom on the earth. Read [Isaiah 9:1-7](#) and thank God for this prophecy that one day will be true.

Extra Credit:

Luke also consists of 18 unique parables that are only found in the Luke. Some of them are the Good Samaritan, the Lost Sheep, and the Prodigal Son (Luke 10:25-37, 15:4-7, 15:11-32). Read and meditate on the truths that these parables teach.
